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

Morning and Evening Stars.

VENUS will be morning star until September 25, then evening star the rest of the year. MARS will be evening star during the entire year. JUPITER will be evening star until February 3, then morning star until May 27, then evening star the rest of the year. SATURN will be morning star until February 12, then evening star until November 19, then morning star the rest of the year. The superior planets are regarded as evening stars from their western quadrature to conjunction; and from thence to western quadrature as morning stars.

MERCURY will be brightest and at the most favorable stations for visibility on the 6th of March, July 3, and October 28, being then evening star in the west soon after sunset; also April 25, August 24, and December 12, being then morning star in the east just before sunrise.

VENUS will be farthest west of the sun (46° 48') on the 20th of February, and in superior conjunction with the sun September 25, being invisible for some time before and after this date. It will be at its greatest brilliancy on the 17th of January, rising about 4h. 23m. morning.

Ash Wednesday, March 6; First Sunday in Lent, March 10; Good Friday, April 19; Easter Sunday, April 21; Ascension Day, May 30; Pentecost, June 9; Trinity, June 16; Middle Day of Year, July 2; Advent, Sunday, December 1. Dominical Letter, F; Epact, 25; Golden Number, 6; Solar Cycle, 28; Julian Period, 6580; Jewish Lunar Cycle, 3; Dionysian Period, 196. The year 1867 is the third after leap year, and after July 4 the ninety-second of American Independence; 5627-28th of the Jewish Era, the year 5628 beginning September 30; the 2620th of Rome; the 2643d of the Olympiads, and the 1284th of Mohammed, which begins May 5, and ends April 23, 1868.

Eclipses for 1867.

There will be four Eclipses this year; two of the Sun, and two of the Moon.
 I. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, March 6, invisible in America, but visible in Europe, Africa, and Asia.
 II. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, early in the morning of March 20, (Wednesday,) visible throughout America. In California and Oregon the eclipse will begin in the evening of the 19th. (For the times of the several phases see the annexed table.
 III. A Total Eclipse of the Sun, August 29, invisible in the United States, but visible in South America.
 IV. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, Friday evening, Sept. 13, visible in America, generally. This Eclipse will begin before the Moon rises, at places west of Boston, and it will therefore rise more or less eclipsed. In the Pacific States this Eclipse will be invisible. The times of its phases are shown in the following table:

The Planets.

VENUS at the close of the year 1866 shows beautifully as a morning star, increasing in splendor until the 17th of January, when the area of its illuminated disc is greatest. It rises then about 4h. 23m. morning. On the 20th of February it reaches its greatest departure or elongation from the Sun west, from

whence it moves off toward the Sun and superior conjunction, with daily decreasing light and size, and becomes lost in the Sun's light on the 25th of September, being then furthest from the Earth, and its disc, if visible, will be a perfect circle. After this date it will soon appear as evening star, low in the west soon after sunset, and daily appearing further east of the Sun. On the 1st of January it will be northeast of Antares; on the 5th of February it enters Sagittarius; and March 8 it will be 3° south of β Capricorn, and April 4 it will be 9° south of γ Aquarii, the brightest star in the Urn.

MARS will appear largest January 10, when in opposition, being then nearest the Earth, and its diameter about four times as large as when at its conjunction. January 1 it will be nearly in a line with Castor and Pollux, southeast of them. On the 7th of January it will be 2½° south of Pollux, and on the 14th 6° south of Castor, and on the 7th of April it will be back again due south of Pollux, but now 4½° south of it, and 18° north of Procyon. After June the planet will be rather inconspicuous.

JUPITER will be very interesting after the 1st of June, and on the 26th of August it will be largest, being at its opposition, and appearing three times as large as Mars did on the 10th of January. December 9 it will be 10° due south of the brightest star in the Urn.

SATURN will be in Libra nearly all of the year, northwest of Antares, and will be brightest at the opposition May 12th.

♃ Mercury, ♀ Venus, ♄ Mars, ♃ Jupiter, ♄ Saturn, ☉ Uranus, ♆ Neptune, ☾ Moon, ♁ opposition, or half a circle apart, ☐ quadrature, or quarter of a circle apart, ☌ conjunction, or together, having the Right Ascension; the word *near*, used above, means the same, and indicates that the two bodies are then on a line running from the North Pole through both. Gr. elong., greatest elongation, or furthest distance from the sun; Stationary, when the planet is without apparent motion, and is about to move in a direction contrary to that it had last. The above table enables us to find the planets throughout the year.

Astronomy and Ancient Dates.

ASTRONOMERS have been enabled to fix the dates of many events in ancient history by means of the natural phenomena recorded in connection with them by historians. Thus a battle between the Medes and the Lydians is proved to have been fought May 28, B. C. 585; for there was a total eclipse of the sun during its progress, and unerring calculations prove that the only eclipse total in Asia Minor at that era was on the day above named.

Directions for Finding the True Time.

THE SUN is on the meridian at 12 o'clock on four days only in the year. It is sometimes as much as 16½ minutes before or after twelve when its shadow strikes the noon-mark on the sun-dial. On each calendar page of this Almanac is shown the exact time when the Sun reaches the meridian, or the shadow the noon-mark; and in order to set a clock or watch correctly, it must, when it is noon by the sun-dial or noon-mark, be set at the time indicated in the Almanac. Thus, on the 25th of January, when the Sun is on the noon-mark, the watch must be set 12 min-

utes and 34 seconds past twelve, which will be the true time. The practice of setting time-pieces by the rising or setting of the Sun or Moon is not strictly correct; as the unevenness of the Earth's surface and intervening objects, such as hills and forests, near the points of rising and setting, occasion a deviation, in every place, from the time expressed in the Almanac, which time is adapted to a smooth, level horizon. The only means of keeping correct time is by the use of a noon-mark, or a meridian-line.

To Ascertain the Length of the Day and Night.

AT any time of the year, add 12 hours to the time of the Sun's setting, and from the sum subtract the time of rising, for the *length of the day*. Subtract the time of setting from 12 hours, and to the remainder add the time of rising next morning, for the *length of the night*. These rules are equally true for *apparent* time.

FEBRUARY derived its name from *Februm*, an old Sabine word signifying purification. On the 15th of this month the Romans kept the *Februa*, a general festival of expiation for the year, which then closed with this month.

When Julius Cæsar as Pontifex Maximus changed the calendar, February was made the second month, and one additional day was allowed to every fourth year to keep the position of the equinoxes at the same date. One day in four years was more than was required, and the excess by the year 1582 amounted to ten days. In this year Pope Gregory XIII readjusted the calendar, and from this we have the Gregorian Calendar.

DAYS OF THE WEEK.

TUESDAY derived its name from *Tuisca*, a goddess worshipped on that day.

THURSDAY derived its name from *Thor*, the God of Thunder, who was worshipped that day.

FRIDAY is so called in honor of *Frea*, a goddess that they worshipped as the opener of nature.

THE original meaning of the word *Sabbath* is rest. The seventh day of creation was called Sabbath, for on that day God rested from his labors. The Jews were required to keep holy the seventh day. There are some preachers here enumerated whose addresses we could not obtain, and hence their names do not appear on the register.

Our aggregate of members by States we have gathered from the reports received, but from other sources we think we have [sufficient evidence to warrant us in making the grand total for the United States 500,000. The report is a very meager one, of course. Statistics of part of the States are accurate, taken from reports from every county. The Middle and Southern States have not reported as we had desired—the South being in such a disorganized condition as to render it impossible to obtain a very correct report from that section. In some of the States, both north and south, there are a few of our prominent men, somewhat superstitious, of course, possessing much valuable information, who have withheld it for the reason that they were opposed to the movement, thinking that, perhaps, we might meet the same sad fate the Israelites did when David attempted to number them. With the aid of those interested we hope to be able to give a report by counties, and perhaps by congregations, with the name and address of every Christian preacher, in our Annual for 1868.

Not being able to give a complete report of the work in the British possessions of North America, we have omitted them altogether. We now ask every interested person, no matter in what land he may live, to assist us in making our Annual for 1868 complete. For your labors the Lord of the harvest will bless you.

 NOTABLE JEWISH DAYS.

 THE FEAST OF THE PASSOVER



AS instituted in memory of that night of mercy, when the Lord passed over the families of the children of Israel, and destroyed the first-born of every household of the Egyptians.

It was called the "Feast of Unleavened Bread," because, while it lasted, unleavened bread, alone, was eaten by the people.

The festival lasted from the 15th to the 21st of the month *Abib*, or *Nisan*, the first of the sacred year. The most important occurrence of the week was the sacred supper, which was required to be prepared by every family. The victims for the feast were selected on the 10th, and killed on the evening of the 14th, a short time before the 15th began to be reckoned. The supper was prepared and eaten at night, on the commencement of the 15th of the month.

 THE FEAST OF WEEKS.

This feast was celebrated at the close of harvest, as a festival of thanks for the goodness of God in the blessings of the field. It was called the "Feast of Weeks," because its return was determined by reckoning a week of weeks, or forty-nine days. It was also called *pentecost*, from *pentecosta*, a Greek word meaning fiftieth, and this was the fiftieth day from the eating of the passover supper.

On this day the Holy Spirit descended upon the Apostles, and salvation was offered to the race of man.

 THE FEAST OF TABERNACLES.

This feast was celebrated from the 15th to the 23d of the seventh month, *Tishri*, with which the civil year had its commencement. It was kept as a memorial of the journey of the children of Israel through the wilderness, and its appointment had respect, also, to the season of vintage and gathering of fruits, at the close of which it was observed. Hence it is sometimes called the "*feast of ingathering*."

It is called the Feast of Tabernacles, because all the people were required to dwell in booths, tents, temporary dwellings made of the branches of trees, during the celebration.

 THE GREAT DAY OF ATONEMENT.

The tenth day of the month *Tishri*, was the most important and solemn of the ceremonial system. This was the Great Day of Atonement, when a service of expiation was performed in behalf of the whole nation.

A goat was slain by the High Priest for a sin-offering, and the guilt of the entire congregation was placed upon the head of a second goat, which was sent away into the wilderness.

This day was annually kept sacred, as one for rigid fasting, humiliation and prayer.

A PATENT SERMON.



ERILY, verily, I say unto thee except a man be born of the bench and of the timber he cannot enter into our kingdom.—*Traditions of Men*, chap. 3: 5.

Our subject will naturally suggest the following points: *First*, What, or whose kingdom is it? *Second*, The privileges of the kingdom; *Third*, The manner of entrance; *Fourth*, The obligations of the citizens.

First, Whose kingdom is this? The kingdom of the clergy. This kingdom is the property of those who claim all the honors of earth, all the titles and dignities, whether heard or unheard. The proprietors, by prescription, have long held undisturbed possession of the highest title of Deity himself. (*Holy and Reverend* is his name.) They have fearlessly used those prerogatives which certain antiquated ones, such as Paul and Jaffies, of days of yore, taught belonged to God alone. (See James iv: 12.) "There is one Lawgiver who is able to save or to destroy." (Eph. iii.: 15.) "Of whom the whole family in heaven and on earth is named." Now, although these antiquated ones thought that no one but the Lord alone had a right to legislate in religious matters, to give a name or names by which religious persons should be recognized and known, yet these knew not of the march of mind, nor of the *retrograde progress of latter days*, that has called for laws from the clergy, so that all things may be pleasing to all; that thereby we may gain the more. This kingdom is the kingdom of the clergy. They say it is our kingdom—"our Zion"—we built it—we own and govern it.

The nature and privileges: This kingdom is peculiar in these things. Here pride and fashion hold their court. Here do congregate the *elite* of our towns and cities. Here, too, Pleasure's train is found, her favor sought and won. Here, likewise, except in those minor matters where the authority of the proprietors must be acknowledged, each may walk in his own way and do whatever seemeth right in his own eyes. Here, too, all who look for honor and preferment in this world seek an entrance. Now, in order that we should be explicit under this head, permit me to say that the especial privileges enjoyed by the citizens of this kingdom depend very much upon the province you enter. Should you enter the department occupied by the Presbyterians, you will find the climate cool and calm. No sweltering heat nor really freezing cold, but a November atmosphere the year round. Here, however, the inhabitants boast of unflinching loyalty to their lawgivers, the clergy. This is their glory. In the Methodist province the climate is much more changeable; extremes of heat and cold prevail. Here the citizens have frequent attacks of chills and fever. While this is their prevailing disease, they claim that they are much more free from the sleeping lethargy than their neighbors in the Presbyterian province. The truth is, each department glories in its own peculiarities.

And now, if you wish to enter, there is but one thing to be done—"be born of the bench and the timber." That is all. The method is both simple and fashionable. Thus entering, live according to the laws of the kingdom, and verily I say unto you ye shall not lose your reward.

THE BIRTH OF THE SAVIOUR.


“To us a child of hope is born,

FAITH—BELIEF.



ow faith is the confident expectation of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.—Heb., xi:1. In this quotation we have an authoritative definition of the word *Faith*. Whatever may be said to the contrary by theologians of the day concerning this important matter, yet it will ever remain true that one or the other of the definitions at the head of this article will correctly define the term faith, or belief, in every place in the entire Gospel where the belief of the truth, confidence in God and his Son, Jesus Christ, is indicated. Verse 6: "But without faith it is impossible to please God, for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is the rewarder of them that diligently seek him." Here the terms *faith* and *belief* are used interchangeably. They mean the same thing. Another important statement is also here made. It is this: "Without faith it is impossible to please God, for (because) he that cometh to God must believe that he is a rewarder," etc. This settles this matter, viz: which have the precedence, faith or repentance? Repentance before faith is to all intents and purposes, repentance *without* faith, and as long as it is true that without faith it is impossible to please God, so long it will remain true that repentance *before* faith will be ever of no avail; for it will be of no avail because not pleasing to God.

Let no one then put darkness for light by pleading for repentance before faith. This faith is the result of hearing—examining evidence: 1st John v. 9—"If we receive the testimony of men, the testimony of God is greater." The testimony of both man and God is to be received in the same manner, with this one difference: the testimony of God is more worthy of implicit confidence, but alike in both cases. Rom., x: 17—"So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God," (or men, as the case may be.) By faith we receive intelligence—learn: Heb., xi: 3—"Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God." Through belief of the truth spoken by the Saviour and his Apostles we learn that God first so loved us as to give his Son a ransom for us. And the Saviour's language being true—Luke vi-33—"Sinners will love those that love them:" 1 John iv-19—"We love him, because he first loved us." Thus having heard and learned that God did first love us, we now begin to realize our ingratitude to him who has so richly loved us. Our thoughts being turned in the channel of his love, we regret, we lament, having sinned against so good, so gracious a Being. This results in a loathing of sin—a Godly sorrow for sin. This prepares the sinner to do that which he could not do before, viz: Repent.

As faith is produced by the gospel, this, has given occasion for the metonymic use of the term faith to indicate the gospel. (Rom. y: 1. "Therefore being justified by faith." That is, being justified by the gospel. "Earnestly contend for the faith once delivered to the Saints." A notice of this will obviate much of the obscurity which otherwise would be apparent. The rule is this, wherever the word gospel will make good sense instead of the word faith, in all such cases the term faith indicates gospel. "God * * * put no difference between them and us, purifying their hearts by faith," (by the gospel.) This, with the quotations above, will serve as a key. The word 'grace' is used in a similar manner. "By grace are you saved"—by the gospel. Neither belief only, nor grace only, ever saved any one. But these, combined with gospel instrumentalities, secure the result.

Those who forsake the house of prayer are guilty of many crimes. *First*—They transgress the Divine Law, inasmuch as it demands punctuality at the assemblage of the Saints. *Second*—They do not do to others as they would have others do to them, in that, by their example, they discourage them in the work of redemption. *Third*—They are commanded to pray with, exhort, instruct, and build up each other on their most holy faith, and instead of this, by their examples, they are tearing down even the good works of their brethren. Reader, beware!

REPENTANCE.



ATTENDING, both to Jews and Greeks, repentance toward God, and faith toward our Lord Jesus Christ.—Acts xx: 21.

In this language the Apostle specifies the object of both faith and repentance. The latter has direct reference to the authority of God, the Father. The former points to God's Son as worthy of all confidence. The reason why repentance is first named in the text is not because that, in the order of events it is first; but because of its being indissolubly connected with God's authority, it must, in the nature of things, be mentioned in the same connection with that of the name of the Father, with whose authority it stands connected. Now, as the law of language requires that where Father and Son are together spoken of, not only must the Father be named first, but when we mention the name of the first we must, of necessity, mention that which is connected with it. Let this be our reason why repentance is placed first in the text. In our article on faith we demonstrated that the influence, or effect of faith, was the production of a regret, or sorrow, because we have sinned against God, who first loved us. This sorrow produces a change of heart or mind—a determination, deep-seated and unyielding, to break off our sins by righteousness, and our iniquities by turning to the Lord, who will have mercy, and to our God, who will abundantly pardon. In this way the goodness of God leadeth to repentance. Godly sorrow produces it, and works, fruit, meet for it, follows after it. We now see that repentance is midway between a Godly sorrow for having done wrong and a turning about and doing right. It is not, and cannot be a Godly sorrow for sin, because this must first exist as its producing cause; nor is it reformation in life, for this, as its fruit, must follow it.

Repentance is a change of heart, of the mind or purpose—a determination not only negatively not to live in open rebellion against God, but also, actively, to yield obedience to his authority, to become his servant, to consecrate one's self, soul, body and spirit, to his service. This repentance, having reference to the authority of God, the penitent will be satisfied with nothing short of submission to the command of the Lord. The language of the penitent heart is

“Here, Lord, I give myself away,
’Tis all that I can do.”

BAPTISM—IMMERSION.

BAPTISM is a Greek word anglicised, that is, adopted into the English language without translation. What is baptism? is a question that has perplexed the minds of many. This question we propose answering in a brief, simple manner. This, like every similar question, must be settled by an appeal to the laws of language—the meaning of words. “One Lord, one faith, one baptism.” Eph. iv. : 5. The word “baptism” is a noun, the name of an act or thing done. This is evident, from the fact that it is derived from the active, transitive verb, *to baptize*. It is also the name of one act or thing done, and but one. This is evident from the words of the text, “one baptism.” Baptism, then, is one thing, and but one. Now, as sprinkling is one thing, pouring is another, and immersion is yet another, it follows that baptism can be but one of these; for one thing can not be two or more things. If, then, sprinkling is baptism, pouring and immersion neither are, nor can be. So, also, if pouring is baptism, sprinkling and immersion are not. Thus, finally, if immersion is baptism, neither pouring nor sprinkling are. These all being different acts, and baptism being but one act, it cannot be but one of them. Again, as baptism is something done, whatever is done by the act indicated by the term baptism, that, and that only, is the meaning of the word. We are now prepared to inquire, What is done when a person is baptized? Who shall be witness here? Will the testimony of Paul, the apostle to the Gentiles, be acceptable? Paul, what is done when a person is baptized? “Therefore we are *buried* with him by baptism.”—Rom. 6: 4. “Buried with him in baptism, wherein also ye are risen with him, through the faith of the operation of God, who hath raised him from the dead.”—Col. 2: 12. Paul being witness, baptism is a burial. A person in being baptized must be buried—“buried in baptism.” So the witness decides.

The object, the same as repentance: If one is because sins have been remitted, so is the other. “Repent and be baptized every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ, for the remission of sins.”—Acts 2: 38. “And now, why tarriest thou? Arise, and be baptized, and wash away thy sins, calling on the name of the Lord.”—Acts 22; 16. “He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved.”—Mark 16: 16. P. T. RUSSELL.

Then weave thy chaplet of flowers, and strew the beauties of nature about the grave; console thy broken spirit, if thou canst, with these tender, yet futile tributes of regret; but take warning by the bitterness of this thy contrite affliction over the dead, and be more faithful and affectionate in the discharge of thy duties to the living.

 Without a flower at all.



THE CONDITIONS OF ETERNAL LIFE.

Am I a member of that body? Not unless you have submitted to the rite of initiation,—not unless you have obeyed from the heart that form of doctrine which the Apostle delivered,—not unless you have believed, repented, and been baptized; for the Apostle says, "Without faith it is impossible to please God," and Jesus says that unless we repent we shall all perish, and Paul says we are baptized into Christ.

Have I faith? Not unless you believe the testimony which God has given of his Son,—not unless you believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God; for this is the faith which the Scriptures require, and which will lead to repentance.

Have I repented? Not unless you have a godly sorrow for your sins,—not unless you have determined to turn from them, to cease to do evil and learn to do well; for this is the repentance which the Scriptures demand, and which prepares the believer for the confession of the name of Christ, and for baptism.

Have I been baptized? Not unless you have gone down into the water, as did your Saviour, and as did Philip and the Eunuch, and there been buried beneath the waters,—not unless you have arisen from the watery grave with a full purpose of heart to lead a new life; for Paul says those who have been baptized into Christ have been buried with him by baptism, and, that like as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so they should arise to walk in newness of life.

Am I then sure of the promise? Not unless you continue steadfastly in the Apostle's doctrine, in fellowship, in breaking of bread, and in prayers,—not unless you faithfully discharge the obligations of the Christian life; for Peter says it is better not to have known the way of righteousness, than to have known it, and then turn from the holy commandment delivered.

If I do this, have I the promise of eternal life? Yes; for the Apostle says that those who, by a faithful continuance in the ways of well-doing, seek for glory, honor, and immortality, shall be recompensed with eternal life.—*Morning Watch.*
